## PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Friends.

Christmas seems to start earlier every year. The new concept of 'Black Friday' – the day after the American Thanksgiving, that makes so little sense here – has brought forward the switching-on of many High Street Christmas lights to early November. Apparently some big shops put their decorations up during October to encourage early shopping. With so much to be done, Christmas can easily become a matter of stress instead of joy.



Some of the older Christmas customs are not so ancient as we might think. Christmas Cards, first sent in the nineteenth century, are slightly older than that other Victorian innovation, the exchanging of seasonal presents. Festive lights, which can make us feel cheerful but which do so unnecessarily increase the world's carbon footprint, are an even more modern invention. Scrooge, if he had lived in a different time and a different place, might have written something like this. He hated sentimentality and forced Christmas cheer, much of it driven by commercial forces. Victor Meldrew might be muttering similar things today.

Christmas is not mainly for children, since grown-ups are hardly exempt from the proclamation first announced by the shepherds; Victor Meldrew and Scrooge are fictional characters but their pessimistic cynicism can be part of any adult. Nor is it even about trying to strip away the secular and cultural accretions from the original festival. We would have no more success with that than peeling away the layers of an onion in the hope of finding a real onion inside.

No: the mystery at the heart of Christmas - secret and hidden, but decreed by God for our glory before the ages began (see 1 Corinthians 2:7) is that described in the beginning of the Fourth Gospel. When the true light began to dawn upon the world it was often unrecognised; and when that light, all the glory of God, finally appeared it had the form of a human baby. That light can penetrate and redeem even the most superficial and cynical layers of the human festival. May that Grace and Peace be with you all in the run up to the season, and in all the days that follow.

#### THE SHEPHERDS STORY

The angel said "Don't be afraid". What a beautiful start to this account of the shepherds visit to baby Jesus.

Angels are found in the Bible in both the Old and the New Testaments, and the word itself means "Messengers of God". I am sure you have thought about angels, and I wonder what comes to mind when we talk about them? There are angels built into the fabric of Steyning Parish Church...how many can you

find? Throughout the ages angels have been seen to be important in Judaism, Christianity, and other faiths, and people have taken note of their messages.

Many times in the Bible when the angel appears, those who see them are afraid, and so their first words are "Do not be afraid, I bring you good news from God".

The visit to the shepherds is the third time in the opening chapters of Luke that we encounter the angel of the Lord.

Firstly, the Archangel Gabriel speaks to Zachariah and gives him the promise of a son.

This promise was fulfilled. Then, Gabriel spoke with Mary and promised her a son and she was to name him Jesus. A promise also fulfilled. On the same night that Mary gave birth to Jesus, the messenger appears the third time, and comes with a host of angels - the Lord's glory - shining around the shepherds - no wonder their response is awe-inspired fear to such bright lights.

The shepherds were watching over the sheep just outside Bethlehem and theirs was a very important job. Because the fields were not way out in the hills it is most likely both sheep and shepherds belonged to the temple, and therefore they were guarded prior to being sacrificed for the Passover. The lambs had to be completely unharmed and without blemish for sacrifice. I love that there was no doubt in the shepherds minds that they would get up immediately and go

and find this new baby.

Before departing, the host of angels excitedly joined together saying:

"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours"

God is offering us peace through his Son. I think that this is the peace we offer each other in church, a shalom. Shalom is a Jewish word meaning to be whole.

Jane Williams' beautiful book "Angels" says about this visit of the angels to the shepherds: "The angels understand that God is working to bring the human world and the angelic world back together, and they are excited to be part of it. They understand that Jesus is going to be God's way of living in the world of human beings, and so making a permanent connection again between humans and God."

Hark! the herald angels sing, Glory to the new born King.


Each element of a Christingle has a special meaning and helps to tell the Christian story:

One of the things that makes Christmas such a memorable time of year is the music.

The same carols and songs that we sing year after year get memorised so we can often recite the words without even thinking about it. Hark the Herald Angels Sing is just one of those carols. If we can stop for a moment and read the words of this carol carefully we will see how it is rooted in scripture.

It was written by Charles Wesley, who was an English Methodist leader and hymn writer. Wesley wrote over 6,000 hymns. His brother, John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, is believed to have said that Charles' hymnal was the best theological book in existence! Methodism was, and still is, known for its singing and worship through song, and Charles was the chief songwriter. We sing many of his hymns in both Steyning and Ashurst churches.

Hark the Herald Angels Sing started life as a poem inspired by London church bells as Charles Wesley was walking to church one Christmas Day, and was first published in 1739 in Hymns and Sacred Poems. The opening line read "Hark, how the welkin (heaven) rings." In 1753 George Whitefield, a colleague of Charles Wesley, adapted the poem into the carol we now sing today. It was Whitefield who created the phrase "newborn King".

### SAINT OF THE MONTH

#### CHRISTINA OF MARKYATE (c1097-1161)

Christina was born about 1097 in Huntingdon the daughter of a rich and influential Anglo Saxon guild merchant. On a pilgrimage to St Albans Abbey in 1112 she made a vow to be celibate. However, this was not acceptable to her parents who appealed to Bishop Robert Bloet of Lincoln. Bishop Robert at first agreed that Christina should not marry the man chosen by her parents but, later, having been bribed he gave judgement against her.

For more than a year she was virtually imprisoned during which she was both betrothed and married against her will even though she refused to consummate



the marriage. She was helped to escape by the hermit, Eadwin, after he had consulted Ralph, Archbishop of Canterbury, about her plight. Christina took refuge at Flamstead with an anchoress named Alfwen. In 1122 her marriage was annulled by the Archbishop of York in view of her earlier vow of celibacy and because the marriage had been solemnised under duress by her parents.

She was able to come out of hiding and lived in a small hut at Markyate close to the cell of Roger, a hermit and sub-deacon of St Albans Abbey, who instructed her in the Faith. Christina spent her time there in prayer, sewing to support herself. She was a skilled needlewoman and embroidered mitres and sandals for Pope Adrian IV, the only Englishman to be elected Pope who had been born in St Albans.

When Roger died, Christina took over the hermitage where she reportedly experienced visions of Jesus, the Virgin Mary and St Margaret. She took her vows at St Albans in 1131. She remained in Markyate for the rest of her life where she attracted disciples as word of her holiness and learning spread. By 1145 her house had become a regular priory of nuns and, although invitations came from various quarters for her to be an abbess elsewhere, she remained at Markyate.

Christina is said to have been an able person who worked closely over many years with Geoffrey, Abbot of St Albans, to deepen the people's spirituality and alleviate poverty in the area. She died on 5th December 1161 much revered and the Church designated that date as her Feast Day. The nunnery at Markyate continued until it was disbanded as a result of the Henrician persecution in 1537.

## **DEANERY SYNOD REPORT**

The October meeting of Deanery Synod, held on this occasion at St Mary's Church, Pulborough, was the most lively and interesting of the many I have attended.

There were two significant items on the agenda which are worth bringing to your attention. The first concerns GS2222 - 'Mission in Revision: A review of the Mission and Pastoral Measure 2011' Members of Deanery Synod were asked to look at a summary of this document as a useful analysis of the mission and pastoral issues that the National Church has to face. It was a challenging read. If you go onto the Church of England website you can find the document and read it if you wish.

I have taken the liberty of quoting the following opening statements from the website:-

"The Church of England's calling is and always has been to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ afresh in each generation to the people of England.

The work to develop the new Vision and Strategy is underway but the foundations are already clear: The Church of England must adapt and put its trust in God to become a simpler, humbler, bolder Church that is Jesus Christ centered and Jesus Christ shaped.

- A simpler Church, both in governance and structure and in the way we live and share the gospel.
- A humbler Church, recognising our failings and working with others to serve the common good.
- A bolder Church energised and enthused by the good news of what God has done in Jesus Christ
  and sharing that with everyone".

Brian Hanson explained that most of the strategies in 'Mission in Revision' would move the church forward. However, he was concerned that some measures outlined would reduce consultation making it easier to close churches. Brian's draft motion reads as follows: "Storrington Deanery Synod considers that the consultation document "Church of England - Mission in

a) includes a significant set of options that shift power and resources within the Dioceses away from PCCs, clergy, patrons and others;

Revision" (GS2222) -

b) contains many options which would make the closing of churches easier and reduce the rights of consultation;

therefore this synod calls upon the General Synod to reassure the Church and the Nation that the widely perceived dismantling of the parish system will not happen and that the rights of consultation and appeal as defined in the Mission and Pastoral Measure 2011 will be retained".

Following energetic discussion the members of Diocesan Synod voted, and the motion was passed by a large majority.

We then moved on to the second interesting thing for members of Deanery Synod to consider, and then ensure that their parish congregation learn about.

Fr Mark and the Revd James di Castiglione, of the Chanctonbury churches, gave a short presentation about Living in Love and Faith. Once again you can access information on the CofE website

introduced by the Archbishop of York Stephen Cotterell in which he says "I hope that Christians will be open and courageous."

Living in Love and Faith addresses questions such as:

- How do we understand and discern God's will?
- Should the Church of England change its' understanding of marriage to same-sex relationships?
- How can the Church of England engage with the LGBTIQ+ community as it is? These are significant questions which we should all learn about and consider. I am looking forward to how we do this in Steyning and Ashurst.


There is a new time and a change of location for Wednesday Coffee. It has been great fun moving forward post pandemic, however we have out-grown the cottage.

### **CHURCH LIGHTING**

#### AND NOW THERE IS LIGHT!

The interior lighting in the church is complete now apart from a few snagging jobs. Many of the congregation and Friends of the Church have had the opportunity to see the wonderful effects of the new lighting, and that at the touch of a button a pre-programmed service or event can be selected giving the lighting needed to create the required ambiance. We now have a system that places us in a good position to meet the demands of today. For example, an 80% saving on energy; ultra-long life on LED lamps; working towards lowering our carbon footprint.

**Exterior lighting** along the long churchyard public path was planned to be completed this year, however, due to the amount of detail required from the overloaded Horsham District Council planning department we missed the application deadline pushing us back to early 2022. Assuming our application is approved the plan is to install four Victorian style lampposts fitted with LED lamps, together with lanterns over the main church door and the south-east corner of the building. The PCC will also need to apply for a faculty from the diocese once planning permission has been granted.

The existing floodlighting will be updated with LED lamps. All this lighting will be controlled by a single timeclock and light sensor programmed to switch on at dusk and off at midnight. The finance for this work is in place.

Thank you all for your support and patience throughout this lighting project.

#### **TANZANIA**

USPG (United Society Partners in the Gospel) work around the world, but this month I have chosen an article about their work in Tanzania to honour and remember Joyce Townsend as she was so proud of her nursing and mission work there.

#### "BRINGING HOPE TO DISABLED YOUTH IN TANZANIA

Donations from USPG are bringing hope for a better future to young people at a centre for the disabled in Tanzania. The Kwamkono Disabled Children's Centre at Hadeni supports 58 boys and girls with physical disabilities. Funds from USPG have improved the studying environment inside and outside the classroom. Money has been provided for stationery and school uniforms. There were also funds for the the center's garden - paying for seeds and manures and for labourers who helped clear the land. The garden is used to help train the children in growing vegetables.

On a bigger scale, funds from USPG were used to prepare nine hectares on the Centre's farms for cultivation. This paid for bush clearance, buying seeds and paying labourers. Crops grown on the land are all used to feed the children.

During the Covid-19 pandemic the Centre has taken measures to protect the children. Under the direction of the government, and using a donation from USPG, it bought buckets and soap to make sure the children were able to take extra hygiene measures to remain safe."

Formerly known as the Kwamkono Polio Hostel, the Kwamkkono Disabled Children's Centre provides a home for children with physical disabilities, and funds their education and rehabilitation. The centre was established 1962 and is based in the Tanga Diocese of the Anglican Church of Tanzania (ACT).



## **MEDICINES FOR MUHEZA**


Joyce Townsend, who sadly died at the end of October, was a mission midwife alongside the charity Medicines for Muheza, a UK registered charity which helps transform the work at St.

Augustine's Hospital in Muheza, Tanzania. The charity fundraises to supply many things that the hospital needs, including: Top-ups to staff salaries to ensure well-qualified staff stay; Some specialised drugs; Ward renovation and building projects; New vehicles; Child feeding programmes.

Joyce spoke very warmly of all Tanzanian people, and "Karibu" (You are welcome) is heard repeatedly and it is genuine.

For many years Steyning Parish Church supported Medicines for Muheza financially, and helped Joyce keep in contact with their work during her retirement here in Steyning.

## RECIPE FOR DECEMBER

#### STORE CUPBOARD MEATBALLS

## **Ingredients**


1 pack of pre made meatballs

1 tbsp olive oil

1 brown onion, chopped

1-3 garlic clove, finely chopped, depending on your garlic tolerance

1 tsp dried mixed herbs400g tin tomatoes500ml/18fl oz vegetable or beef stock (use 2 cubes)



1 tbsp of garlic paste (only use if you like an extra garlic hit)

1 tsp chilli flakes if you like an extra bit of heat.

200g/7oz dried spaghetti

salt and pepper

1 pack of mozzarella



- 1. Heat a large saucepan over a medium heat and add the olive oil. Once hot, add the onion and cook gently without browning for 4–5 minutes, or until softened and translucent. Add the garlic, continue to cook for 2 minutes until aromatic, then add the dried herbs, tomatoes and stock. Bring the sauce to a simmer, reduce the heat and simmer gently. I usually make this in the morning and pop it in the fridge once cooled until needed later in the day.
- 2. Heat a frying pan over a medium heat and add the olive oil. Once hot, fry the meatballs on all sides until nicely coloured, being careful not to burn them. You may need to do this in batches. Transfer to the saucepan containing the sauce.
- 3. Now add the tomato puree, garlic paste and chilli flakes, if using, to the tomato sauce.
- 4. Continue to simmer the sauce for 10 minutes while you cook the spaghetti. Longer if cooking the sauce from cold.
- 5. Bring a large saucepan water to the boil, add a pinch of salt and cook the spaghetti according to the packet instructions. Once cooked, drain and tip into the saucepan with the meatball sauce. Mix well and serve hot.
- 6. Tear the mozzarella over the meatballs. Add cracked black pepper if desired.

## **LONG-TAILED TITS**

"Who are these people?" You've

hardly seen them all year yet here you are, full of turkey, squashed between them on the sofa, your paper hat askew. It's Christmas and, like it or not, there's no escaping your family. On a branch out in the cold darkness of the garden, also sandwiched between aunts, brothers, cousins and



daughters, a tiny bird is asking a similar question (except he isn't wearing a novelty hat).

Long-tailed Tits and humans. Two of Britain's most social species. And just like a visit from your relatives the arrival of a Long-tailed Tit flock in your garden will turn tranquility into chaos. It's like someone has emptied a box of feathered fireworks over the fence. They manically bicker on the bird feeder and swing acrobatically upside-down on the fat balls, all the while trilling, rattling and screaming 'eee-heee' like a troupe of Michael Jackson impersonators. What you're witnessing is a group of roving relatives, roaming the neighbourhood looking to pillage your peanuts. This posse of outlaws consists of in-laws, brothers, sons, daughters. It's a family affair. With their gorgeous pink, black and white plumage and those ridiculously long tails these flying lollypops must qualify for Britain's cutest bird. Then suddenly they're gone and the pulse rate of the garden returns to normal.

By late-winter the Long-tailed Tit's extended family will drift apart, find new partners and start new families. In March the foundations are laid for an epic construction. Moss building bricks are lashed together with ropes of sticky spider's webs. The walls rise, a camouflage cladding of lichen is added to the roof and a cosy filling of a thousand feathers lines the interior. The end result looks a crocheted stomach and soon there will be plenty of rumbling from inside as eight hungry chicks demand to be fed. But raising a large family can take its toll. The constant hunt for insects can exhaust a parent almost to breaking point. And that's when something unusual and wonderful happens. Their family arrives to save them. Aunties and uncles who have not been successful raising their own family that year will selflessly join the parents and help feed their nephews and nieces.

Even after the children have flown the nest the whole gang remains together and joins with other siblings to form your chaotic neighbourhood feeding flock. But the biggest challenge of the year still awaits: winter. Freezing night-time temperatures exact a heavy toll on our garden birds. And that's why at Christmas, hidden deep in a hedge, you'll find the extended family of Long-tailed Tits, huddled together, supporting each other on a frosty branch, their tiny hearts beating, sharing their warmth and surviving. So if you're wondering why family is so important look out of the window and think of that Long-tailed Tit, because none of us can get through this on our own.
